<u>Camino Chronicle: Walking to Santiago</u> is the latest book by Susan Alcorn, and a real treat. Susan has something for all readers from personal stories from her own pilgrimage with her husband Ralph during the days of the 9/11 tragedy. One can feel her empathy and desire to make her journey meaningful and relevant as she grapples with not only the uncertainty of lodging and food and blisters along the way, but larger reflections of the unfolding events both in America and along the path. Her observations are interspersed with snippets of cultural history, delightful and informative tales about the food and wine of the regions of Spain and the very real rigors and joys of pilgrim life as they make their way along the Camino Frances. (Her backpacking tips are useful too.)

A pilgrim does not cheat, each pilgrim is authentic.
